2022 GENERAL ELECTION REPORT

November 9, 2022

- Republicans swept all statewide races in Alabama.
- The balance of power in the Legislature remains:
 - Senate - 27 Republican / 8 Democrat
 - House – 77 Republican / 28 Democrat.
- Republicans and Democrats swapped two seats in the House. Incumbent Charlotte Meadows (R) lost to Phillip Ensler(D) in Montgomery and Incumbent Dexter Grimsley (D) lost to Rick Rehm (R) in Henry County.

- Republicans running statewide with a Democratic opponent consistently earned 66-68 percent of the vote.
- Republicans running statewide with only Libertarian opponents consistently gained about 84 percent of the vote.
- In 2023 twenty-six percent of legislators will be freshmen and approximately half will be in their first or second term.

- House Republican Caucus leadership elections for Speaker, Majority Leader and Speaker Pro Tem: **November 10.**
 - Speaker candidates: Rep. Steve Clouse (R-Ozark) vs Rep. Nathaniel Ledbetter (R-Rainsville)
- Senate President Pro Tem Greg Reed (R-Jasper) and Senate Majority Leader Clay Scofield (R-Guntersville) are expected to be nominated by their caucus to serve another term in Senate leadership.
